January in the Church's Life

It feels like January. Fortunately, it is a little warmer (in our sort of Spring, we keep hoping!). But it feels like January; it is a time in the church's life to look backwards and to look ahead. Every January we see the image of the old god Janus with two faces, looking both ways.

We look backwards with gratitude. We are grateful for the dedicated ministry of two interim ministers, Rev David Gregory and Rev Jo Page. It was unexpected. Some thought David 'too busy' to consider being an interim. Some thought Jo was no longer 'in the loop' with parish ministry. So much for that planning! Both accepted the call, and both contributed greatly to the interim time, and both gained a great deal as well. We certainly wish David well as he continues to develop the ministry at Spirit of Peace; and we certainly wish Jo well as she continues to seek areas of ministry, more likely with a congregation.

We are equally grateful for the dedicated ministry of the Search Committee. Chaired by Faye Saville, the Committee went 'above and beyond' in their work of discernment, research, reading, interviewing, and all the rest. The Committee went the 'extra mile' and the Chair often went beyond the extra mile. Their work is not quite done. Their last step is to help plan our settled pastor's installation service, which will be in the Fall. We celebrate the Committee's work.

We are grateful as well for the all the members who stepped forward during the interim time to take on what needed to be done. Some of this we know, some we do not. But we are grateful to all. An interim time is an exercise in resiliency. We can be grateful that it shows again that we are a resilient congregation. Or as I have said before: change is inevitable but transformation is optional. It is something we live in to.

But now we look ahead. We need to take what we have learned. I encourage us to remember some words by David Gregory in his last sermon here by encouraging us to 'celebrate the past but let go of it.' This is a challenge for any congregation with a history, but particularly in this community. It is so easy and romantic to recall the glory days of GE, think about 4 department stores downtown, and the like. In the congregation, we like to recall also what some see as glory days: more staff, more members, more youth, it goes on. God calls us to look ahead: "Behold this new thing I am doing" Scripture informs us. The future, thank God, is not like the past only longer (Darryl Strawberry, baseball philosopher said that); but it will be

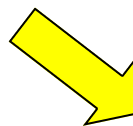

News from Nicaragua...

During our three months in Nicaragua ,we did not have the opportunity to visit our sister church, Getsemani Baptist in Los Gutierrez Norte that is located three hours of challenging travel from where we live. However, we did talk with the former pastor of the church, Rev. Carlos Castillo, who is not well and could use the prayers of people from Emmanuel Friedens. Carlos is 76 and has a large, loving family of children, grandchildren, and great grandchildren by his side. As a pastor, he gets free medical care from the Baptist Hospital in Managua, and he is a man of strong faith. Of Interest...**UCC Files Historic Lawsuit on Marriage and Freedom of Religion**

The General Synod of the United Church of Christ (UCC) filed a lawsuit on April 28 in US District Court in Charlotte, North Carolina arguing that North Carolina laws defining and regulating marriage as between a man and woman restrict UCC ministers from performing their religious duties and are unconstitutional.

Although filed by the General Synod, there are 150 UCC congregations in North Carolina. Currently the state of North Carolina prevents couples of the same gender from obtaining a marriage license and makes it a crime for ministers to officiate at a marriage ceremony without determining whether the couple involved has a license. The UCC in the lawsuit argues that the law limits ministers' choices, violates the principle of "free exercise of religion" upon which the church is built, and restricts the freedoms of religion and expressive association guaranteed in the First Amendment.

In announcing the action, Rev. Geoffrey A Black, general minister and president of the UCC (and previously Conference Minister of NY) said, "The United Church of Christ is proud to defend the religious freedoms upon which this nation was founded. It is unfortunate that even today laws are designed to treat gay and lesbian people unequally. In its efforts to restrict marriage, the state of North Carolina has restricted one of the essential freedoms of our ministers and of all Americans."

The Rev. Dr. J Bennett Guess, an officer of the Church and openly gay man said, "The United Church of Christ believes in advocating for justice. We believe that the UCC is called to be a prophetic church. God calls the church to speak truth to power. We are standing up for the freedom of religion, and to protect the rights of our ministers to do their jobs in faith."

The background is that In 2012, North Carolina voters approved Amendment One, which limited a domestic legal union to a covenant between a man and woman. Under state laws consistent with Amendment One, it is a Class 1 misdemeanor for a minister to perform a marriage ceremony for a couple that hasn't obtained a license, and such a license may not be issued to same-gender couples. A Class 1 misdemeanor is punishable by up to 120 days in jail and/or probation and community service. In addition, the laws allow anyone to sue the minister who performs a marriage ceremony without a license and collect up to \$200 if they prevail. The UCC believes that this prohibition and penalties also apply to a minister performing a religious ceremony not intended to result in a legal marriage.

This limitation on free exercise of ministers, officers or others is in conflict with the UCC General Synod's *Equal Marriage Rights for All* resolution adopted on July 4, 2005. This resolution affirms "equal marriage rights for couples regardless of gender and declares that government should not interfere with couples regardless of gender who choose to marry and share fully and equally in the rights, responsibilities and commitment of legally recognized marriage."

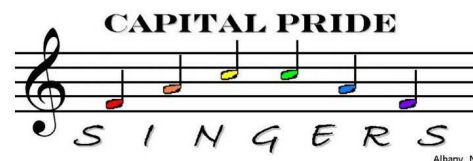
